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#### TRUSTEES REPORT

# FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the association's constitution and bye-laws, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity was established as an Association by constitution and bye-laws adopted on 12 October 1974 (as amended 12 May 1984 and 27 September 2014).

The Trustees who served during the year were:

Trustees are selected by election at Annual General Meeting or exceptionally at Special General Meeting, for a three year term. One trustee retires per year in rotation. Mrs Atkins retired in 2017 and was re-elected at the AGM.

The trustees are involved in the day to day running of the charity, with the support of the Treasurer, Susan Margaret Gadd.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the association is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

#### Objectives and activities

The aim of the Association is to be of service to the Church in Sussex within the Diocese of Chichester, by promoting the ringing of church bells to call people to worship; by encouraging the recruitment and training of all ringers and advancing the art of change ringing; and by supporting the proper care and use of church bells and belfries. It is an affiliate of the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers and abides by the Rules and Decisions of the Council.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the association should undertake.

The main activities of the charity are:

- promoting the ringing of church bells to call people to worship;
- encouraging the recruitment and training of all ringers and advancing the art of change ringing;
- supporting the proper care and use of church bells and belfries;
- providing support to projects to restore, maintain or improve existing bells, and the towers and belfries
  housing them, and seeking the preservation of bells from redundant churches for the purpose of
  ringing in churches.

#### Achievements and performance

The membership of the Association declined to 1,250 (of whom 56 are junior members) but this is sufficient to ensure that most bells in Sussex Churches are rung regularly every Sunday. To facilitate skill development and the ringing community, regular practices and workshops have been organised throughout the County by the Association, the Districts and local groups of towers, and have included members, visitors from out of county and non-members. There have also been a range of training opportunities, including the return of the 2-day Autumn courses, and several full day and half-day events offering courses for a range of abilities, which were popular.

We keep in regular touch with our members by distributing quarterly District newsletters and monthly District calendars of events, maintaining a website, running a Twitter account and a Facebook group, and via emails announcing special events. Our Association subscription magazine Soundbow continues to be published quarterly.

The young ringers group remains very active. There were several County-wide Young Ringers practices over the year, which were well-attended, and the young ringers themselves organised an outing to the towers in Eastbourne in October half-term. We entered two teams in the SE Regional striking competition held at Kings Langley in Hertfordshire, coming first and second. The Sussex team also entered the Ringing World National Youth Competition in Birmingham, ringing Grandsire Triples in the method category, qualifying for the grand final, and coming 2<sup>nd</sup> equal in the method category, and third equal in the overall competition (of 19 teams).

In addition to normal service and wedding ringing for the church and community, 28 peals and 787 quarter peals were recorded in 2017 on tower bells, with many rung in memoriam, to celebrate weddings, significant anniversaries and birthdays, to mark historical events such as the 150th year since the consecration of SS Saviour and Peter in Eastbourne, and to commemorate the centenary of ringers who gave their lives in World War I. On handbells, another record number (36) of peals were rung for the Association during the year and there were 23 quarter peals rung in hand.

#### Financial review

Principal sources of income in 2017 continue to be membership fees, donations, a generous legacy from Pauline Burtt of £5,000 to the BRF, and some bank interest. The association had a healthy cash balance of £83,330 at the year end, an increase of £4,771 compared with the 2016 year end position. This was largely due to a quiet year for the Bell Restoration Fund.

Financially the Association remained broadly the same in terms of subscriptions and running costs, with a surplus in the unrestricted funds of £3,107 over the year.

It was a very quiet year for the BRF and only one grant was paid in 2017, totalling £5,000 for work at Slindon, authorised in 2016. Members of the Association carried out inspections of bell installations across the Diocese and advised and assisted towers with maintenance. The Bell Restoration Fund currently stands at £51,883. All committed grants have been paid.

The Sussex Young Ringers Fund (The Reg Johnston & Harold Wood Memorial Fund) continues to support our young ringers through payment of competition expenses, purchase of team shirts, practice tower donations and outing donations. No training grant applications were received during the year. The value of the Fund at the end of 2017 is £13,583.

It is the policy of the Association that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

The trustees have the power of investment for all funds which have been invested with the Charities Aid Foundation and Cambridge & Counties Bank in this period.

#### NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

## FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The accounts have been prepared to give a true and fair view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Charities SORP (FRS 102) rather than the Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005, which has since been withdrawn.

The Association constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the Association and are rounded to the nearest £.

The association only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

#### 1.2 Incoming resources

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Association that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity, or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

#### 1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings.

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

## 1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

The library and master's chain are shown at Trustees' valuation.

#### 1.5 Accumulated funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

The Sussex Young Ringers Fund (Reg Johnson and Harold Wood Memorial Fund) is a restricted Fund within the Association supporting young people under the age of 25 who are learning change ringing on tower or hand bells. It helps to fund training and skill development, events and activities for young ringers, and to support adults organising those events.
