Edward T (Ted) Baldock 5th January 1936 – 28th September 2012

Ted was the second son of Fred and Mabel Baldock and was born at Polegate in 1936 during the short period that the family lived out of Eastbourne. In 1938 they moved back to Eastbourne and Ted resided in the town for the rest of his life.

As was the custom at St Mary's at the time Ted was recruited to ringing from the confirmation class in 1949, following his older brother Les, who had been recruited similarly in an earlier year. Ted became a regular and reliable member of the St Mary's band and, as the younger brother by several years, I well remember accompanying him and Les to service ringing on many a Sunday evening long before I was old enough to learn and sitting at the top of the staircase leading to the clock room.

By trade, Ted was a printer and joined the Eastbourne firm of Strange the Printer at the beginning of 1951, receiving his first pay packet on his 15th birthday. Knowing nothing at the time of the voluntary nature of ringing, I remember asking my father "Why does he need a job as a printer – *isn't he a bellringer*?" He remained in the printing trade until mid-way through his working life, when the introduction of chemicals into the modern inks caused health problems and he transferred to an office job.

Ted had no ambition to ring methods inside or to ring a peal but was a very reliable treble and tenor ringer and had rung a number of quarter peals, including several with other members of the family for celebratory occasions. As an additional contribution to the wellbeing of St Mary's tower he was the steeplekeeper for a period in the 1960s. Unfortunately, due to health problems, Ted had to give up ringing about 20 years ago.

Amongst Ted's other interests was walking and he was a member of the Eastbourne Rambling Club. It was through this that he met Marjorie and they were married at St Mary's in August 1964 and subsequently had two daughters, Ann and Valerie, who both learned to ring. Ann's younger son, Sean, has now learnt and carrying on the family line of ringers at St Mary's – a line which started with Ted's maternal great-grandfather way back in 1869.

Ted's funeral took place at Eastbourne Crematorium on 23rd October and was well attended by his family and many friends and colleagues. Ann spoke warmly of his loving relationship as the head of the family, of his cheerful disposition and sense of humour, all of which will be greatly missed. In the evening a half-muffled quarter peal of Grandsire Triples was rung at St Mary's by five members of the family and three current members of the local band.

We got up to London by train then walked to the first bell tower - St Olave's, Hart Street (8 bells). The church has a nice set of bells. They are like ours but were a bit heavier.

Secondly we went to St Magnus the Martyr, Lower Thames Street (12 bells) which was a good experience as neither Josh nor I had ever rung on that many (Josh has rung on 8 bells and myself on 10). It was hard as you have to set your bell every stroke and hold up which is difficult.

Next we went to St Lawrence Jewry, Gresham Street (8 bells) which are extremely heavy. The 5th bell is the equivalent to our tenor (our heaviest bell). They were nice bells to ring though. GIFT AID - important changes

(Published in the Ringing World on December 21st 2012)

Some time ago HM Revenue and Customs announced that a change would be required to Gift Aid declarations signed by donors, but it was not well publicised and is now urgent. As from 1st January 2013 a new form of declaration is required from new donors for their donations to be eligible for reclamation of tax under Gift Aid. New donors to charities must now confirm that they will pay enough Income Tax and/or Capital Gains Tax in a year to cover all donations they intend to make that year and that they understand that other taxes such as VAT and Council Tax do not qualify.

However, charities do not need to ask existing donors with enduring declarations to fill in new declarations unless they wish to do so.

Model Gift Aid declarations are to be found on the HMRC website at www.hmrc.gov.uk/ charities/gift_aid/declarations.htm.

The model forms do not have to be used, but declarations provided by charities for their new donors must incorporate the required wording. As before; the forms can be both retrospective and cover all future donations to the charity. Thus ringing societies which claim Gift Aid on donations must now ensure that the new form of declaration is issued to all new donors.

Now for some good news on Gift Aid: the Small Charities Donations Bill currently before Parliament will, if enacted, permit charities to claim Gift Aid on individual donations of up to £20 without the need for Gift Aid declarations, subject to a maximum amount of £ 5,000 per charity per year. To be eligible a charity must have been in existence for at least two years and have made Gift Aid claims in at least two of the previous four years. The target date for implementation of this new scheme is 6th April 2013. Thus ringing societies which qualify will, for example, be able to claim Gift Aid on collections at meetings. The Central Council's Bell Restoration Committee will keep an eye on this and report further in due course.

THE DELIBERATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON 10thNOVEMBER

The standard Agenda format was followed, with a financial update, Val Burgess was not able to be there but a report was forwarded to the Meeting. The committee reports were given verbally and the main points are as follows.

Education; Next year's Young Peoples Striking Competition would be in York on 6th July. The Ringing Foundation had forwarded some information about fund raising, see CCCBR website, this was not recommended by the committee.

Publicity; the committee had updated the Sussex Map, revised the Pocket Guide, given to each new member and issued membership forms to those whose information was not up to date, resulting in 96% database registration.

Safeguarding, the new update should now be on the website and may appear in the newsletters. I quote a part of this regarding what should be checked.

"It is only necessary for people who are <u>responsible</u> for instruction of children to seek CRB checks. Tower Captains, Instructors and any other regular instructors (NOT any other adult ringer who is present during normal practice nights)".

The Bell Restoration Fund stood at £55,482.

The Reg Johnson Account stood at £4,000.

Future events were then discussed; please see the front page of this newsletter.

MEMBERSHIP SURVEY

On behalf of the committee we would like to thank all those who completed the questionnaire. As you will know from previous 'Look To' s the committee wanted to understand what the Eastern Division members wanted in the programme for the coming year. However out of the membership of nearly 350 the actual number of responses was low to a point where they did not form a representative sample and firm conclusions cannot safely be drawn.

In spite of this some observations have been made which we list here. In reading these please remember they were made up from a small sample.

One common area of comment was the distance to travel to meetings. The average distance people were prepared to travel was 16 miles. Virtually no one was prepared to travel more than 25 miles.

- There were several comments on the high cost of fuel.
- Reasons why people did not attend meetings included family commitments, busy life, did not want to travel and non ringing spouses.
- More than one response from ringers who stated they were inexperienced was they would feel uncomfortable in the company of more experienced ringers at a ringing meeting.
- There were a number of ringers who were keen and active in ringing for both practice and service ringing at their own tower and simply had no interest in going elsewhere.
- Meetings with a business meeting attached were less popular.
- A meeting that included a church service was fairly evenly split in popularity.
- The most definitive answer was the universal appeal of the 'ringers tea'.
- With regard to the events provisionally planned, answers in respect of the most popular and the least popular were so well spread as to be meaningless as stated.

No real conclusions can be drawn from the survey in particular for the coming programme. On that basis the programme will proceed very much on the lines of the provisional ideas. Various other comments though are helpful and will be taken into account once again.
