## Master's Mutterings - Graham Hills

On the second Saturday last month, which is normally one of our Practice Days, many ringers from across Sussex descended on Uckfield for the Association's AGM. I know Jack has mentioned this in his Scratchings so I will say no more.

Just a few days before writing these Mutterings, the Western Division had its now infamous Ring, Walk and Ring. We all met at Petworth for some good ringing before donning hiking boots down in the church, whilst enjoying a well-earned cup of coffee. Many thanks to the Petworth ringers and friends for arranging this for us. Unfortunately, due to problems with my joints, I declared myself unfit for the walk, so after a gentle stroll round Petworth, I headed off to Lodsworth in the car.

About nineteen people walked, and enjoyed the sights of the Sussex countryside, including the many deer in Petworth Park, before arriving in Lodsworth just less than 2 hours later as the rain started to fall. The decision then was "Lunch in the Pub" or "Picnic in the Church" before ringing again.

Looking ahead, I know these items will be mentioned elsewhere in the newsletter, but better to tell you twice, than to have people telling me they didn't know. In October, instead of having a ringing practice on the 11<sup>th</sup>, there will be the Annual Divisional Outing. This year we will be ringing at 6 towers in and around Canterbury, including the Cathedral. We are obviously hoping that this will be another enjoyable outing as per previous ones, so if you are interested, please contact me, and if there are sufficient numbers then we can look into hiring a coach for the day. We will be taking deposits nearer the time when the costings have been worked out. Watch this space!

This year it is Western Division's turn to hold the SCACR Social Event. This will be a Shuffleboard Evening in Pulborough Village Hall on October 25<sup>th</sup>. It is easy to play, with no complicated rules. You slide discs along a narrow board and knock them through gaps to score points. It can get quite competitive between teams, and is fun to play. All is booked, and once we have decided what form the meal will take, then we will be able to calculate the cost. More details to follow.

## Scratchings from the Secretary – Jack Burton

The AGM was held at Uckfield and I am sure by now you will have all heard of the result of the voting, but to put you all in the picture as I see it, and how it is likely to affect the Western Division, I will outline what happened. The work of the 'Vision for the Future' group was condensed and presented to the meeting in the form of a proposal to change the rules. They had been re-written to reflect the findings of the group, and it was the simplest way of opening the discussion and forming a resolution for acceptance of their findings. There then took place some considerable discussion which revolved around the working of the rules and the various aspects of membership which were being set aside. These aspects varied from points of policy such as the level of ringing skill on entry to the very specific wording of a rule.

During the discussions it became apparent that although the group had done some considerable work, much of which is being implemented, the rule changes were not going to be adopted. The result was the proposal of a motion which accepted the work of the group but asked for a reconsideration of the wording of the rules. This was adopted and the result as it affects us is 'no change' for this year. A rule writing group has now been established with the aim of having a new set of rules to be presented to individual Divisions at their next ADM. It will then be discussed at the next full General Committee, and a formal proposal put before our next AGM.

How is this all going to change things at Divisional level, you may be asking?

Well, as I see it, the first thing is that the Divisions will remain as at present geographically but they will be called 'Districts'. The only formally elected officer for each district, according to the proposed rules, will be a secretary, and he/she will represent their members on the General Committee. The management of each district will be very much more relaxed and it will be left to the individual district to run itself and elect what officers it sees fit. The whole process of formal regular practices and meetings is to be replaced by more informal practices within groups of towers and the district boundaries are to become more blurred. Districts will be encouraged to establish groups of towers who help each other and run joint practices with each other. The present formal committees at association level will be replaced by four 'groups' of volunteers, who will coordinate and arrange their work without any specific representation from a specific District.

The next Divisional Committee meeting is later in June, and we will have to go to press before it can be reported on, but one item on the agenda is 'what are we going to do about the results of the last AGM'? We will continue as we are for this year right up to the next AGM, so no change. I for one will be seeking to keep the present format of management by a district committee, with elected representatives serving on the specialist working groups at the centre, like education and BRF. Perhaps the lay members of the district committee will, over time, be replaced by the leaders of some of the tower groups, which will form the core of the teaching and gatherings in the district. On that score, I have done a quick count of our 44 towers in the division and 36 of them have an association with at least one other tower already, so I believe we should basically stay as we are and allow things to evolve slowly and as the demands of the time dictate.

That's enough of my soap box about the future, now for the more mundane and routine items. At the AGM Sue Gadd was elected as the new General Treasurer and we all wish her well in her new task. Val Burgess, the last treasurer, has been a tower of strength to the Association and to its members, especially new divisional secretaries on joining. Sue remains as a member of our Divisional Committee where she has been doing some sterling work with our juniors.

The Association is still without a Publicity Officer and we are actively looking for a replacement. If you feel that you could help in this field please make yourself known to a member of a committee. Even though the future administration of Publicity may change after the next AGM, the need for a good publicity person will still be there to lead in any new structure. In the same vein we are seeking a person to oversee the use of 'Facebook' and the way this can be developed into a useful tool to find and inform ringers. Perhaps this would appeal to a younger person who is familiar with the workings of the site and could develop it more for the Association.

On the events front; by the time this edition of Sally Forth goes to print we will have had the South of England Show. The Association was not represented this year although there was a mini-ring there with helpers, so who knows we may have found some more potential ringers. The next big one is the Ringing Roadshow at Newbury on 6th September. The arranging of the autumn social this year falls to the Western Division and will take the form of ringing, followed by supper and Shuffleboard at Pulborough Village Hall.

Please consider my notes above on how I see the future and if you have any points to raise, or comments to make, please let me or one of our committee members know, and above all be ready to see the new draft rules later this year and in time for our next ADM in February.

## Mike's simple calling tips (or is that Simple Mike's calling tips?) – Mike Foster

NB Throughout this ramble I use the usual nomenclature i.e. P is a plain lead end, B is a bob lead end and S is a single lead end.

Here are a few of the things I do to give a bit of variety to the proceedings. (Purists please note, many of these suggestion do not give a true touch i.e. touches where the only duplicated change is rounds at the beginning and end of the touch!)

I also find that it is much easier to see what's happening if you ring the 5<sup>th</sup>.

#### **Bob Doubles:**

We all know the usual 3 call touches that give a true 120 changes (call a bob every time your chosen bell starts 4 blows behind), but how about 100 true changes if you are a bit short of time? Call yourself to run out, then 4 blows behind and repeat once. Note that if you are ringing the 2<sup>nd</sup> or the 4<sup>th</sup> you will get to 4 blows behind before the running out, so call 4 blows behind then run out repeated once.

If you're really short of time, and even the usual 60 changes (bob every other lead) is too long, then how about 20 changes, i.e. a bob every lead for two leads?

The trouble with Bob Doubles is that usually, after about the first 3 leads all the 'experienced' ringers go to sleep having worked out that it is the usual 3 bobs giving either 60 or 120 changes. The 100 change 4 bob touch worries them slightly and they will look at you suspiciously and may accuse you of miscalling it! If you really want to wake them up, then call lots of double bobs (two consecutive leads) wherever you like as this always puts you back to where you were.

As there are two ways of calling a 60 you can also wake people up by joining the two together i.e. BPBPB BPBPBP P, (and you can also do this with 120's).

If you get completely lost then call a bob at alternate leads until the coursing order is either 5324 (rounds at backstroke) or 5423 (rounds at handstroke).

#### **Grandsire Doubles:**

One of the joys of Grandsire (apart from the music) is that there are usually so many calls that the other ringers may not even notice when you start improvising!

A useful technique if you suddenly realise you are running out of time is that you can replace any sequence of SBS with a bob i.e. if you started off calling SBSP SBSP SBSP (120 changes) then a shortened form can be SBSP SBSP BP or SBSP BP BP, which in the limit becomes BP BP (60 changes).

A disadvantage of Grandsire is that unlike Plain Bob you can't ring a true 120 with a learner unaffected by the calls. Never mind, call a bob every time the learner is about to make thirds and it will come round (sometimes more than once unless the learner is on the 3<sup>rd</sup>) and is 90 changes long, which is a bit more exciting than plain courses for the rest of the band.

Again, if you get lost then you can always bring it round by calling the 4<sup>th</sup> into the hunt, and then out of the hunt to dodge with the 5<sup>th</sup> with a bob if the treble is about to turn the 3<sup>rd</sup> from lead, else with a single if the Treble is about to turn the 2<sup>nd</sup>.

#### **Stedman Doubles:**

If you want to call a 120 with 4 singles rather than 2, then call a single each time you finish 45 down to go in quick and each time you do your First Half Turn (point lead at handstroke). You will ring 2 plain courses.

You can improvise with as many singles as you like (in the other calling positions) and it will come round some time after an even number have been called, often when you least expect it!

#### **Bob Minor:**

A good standby is BP BP BP BP BP. Every bell has a go at every piece of work, which is very handy for learners, and you don't finish with a bob so you have time to work out if rounds are coming up! If there is a purist in the band then call PB PB PB PB PB so you don't get 65's at backstroke.

Call any bell to make the bob twice and you are back in the plain course (BPPB). As long as the bell making the bob is not the 4<sup>th</sup> then you can always double up with a single when you are dodging 56 down. If you're really clever you can choose a different bell to make the bob for the second half!

You can extend this even further by repeating the BPPB sequence immediately the first one has finished i.e. BPPB BPPB BPPB..... and it will come round after 240 changes. Of course, to liven things up even more, where you have two consecutive bobs they can be replaced by two consecutive singles. i.e. BPPS SPPB......

That should be enough to confuse everyone so I'd better finish now!

The annual Walk and Ring is always a favourite event and this year it started at Petworth and finished at Lodsworth, about 3 miles away to the west. After some clever busing of 9 people and two dogs from Lodsworth by Jack and Moya, we joined others at St Marys, Petworth to enjoy the beautiful 8 bell ring.

A good turn-out of 20 or more ringers were soon into changes and touches of Grandsire Triples, followed by Bob Doubles on the front with 3 covering bells, so everyone had the chance to delight in one of the best set of bells in the county. Graham organised the ringing and more people arrived to boost numbers to over 24. Refreshments in the church were much appreciated, followed by a group photo which included the two delightful Springer spaniels, Bella (teddy bear coloured) and Darcy (chocolate), straining at the leash.



Under the arched entrance into the park, 19 of us set out to enjoy the 700 acres of the landscaped grounds. A triathlon was being set up by the lake as we passed through and we definitely didn't envy the thought of a swim in the murky waters, so we headed west. Views of mature trees, rolling hills and herds of Roe deer, the largest in England, made a special walk, and our group soon were a line of stragglers enjoying the amazing designs of "Capability Brown" (not Ruth Brown of course).

Fine weather made us glad that the thunderstorms had passed through in the night as we plodded on past Upperton, Tillington vineyard, Pitshill House where George V used to stay for the races, and River, with its little cottages and flower filled gardens. Up and down into woods again, where the dogs took advantage of the puddles and mud like young children (chocolate turned out to be the most practical colour)! Over the little bridge across the River Lod where Jason decided that two washes in the water were needed to make Bella respectable, and soon we were into a field of cows and struggling up to reach Lodsworth village.

This is a rather special area, with well-maintained and very expensive properties, which once were home to Sir Ranulph Fiennes and E. H. Shepard (illustrator of "Winnie the Pooh" books). Next to the field by St Peter's Church there was a large property with an Aston Martin DB7 parked on the drive! The same house was once owned by the Bishop of London in medieval times and it was ancillary to the local criminal court where people were sentenced to be hung on nearby Gallows Hill. We, however, were concerned with a different use for ropes, so after stocking up on picnic lunches, pub food and supplies from the Lodsworth Larder, turned our attention to the light 6 bells of St Peter's. The rain arrived, but we were happy watching it through the open doors as we rang Grandsire, Bob Doubles, Norwich and a bob course of Cambridge. Everyone had a ring and were pushed by Graham to try something new, while others enjoyed the wonderful local village tapestry in the church, which even included an image of 3 bellringers (two more than their local band)! We finished at about 3.30pm and rang down happy not to attempt a guarter peal on the rather noisy bells.

Many thanks to Ruth Brown and Christine Butterfield for the planning, Jack for the taxi services, the ladies for refreshments, for Pip and David for guidance through the footpaths and byeways, and Graham for organising the ringing, which really helped to make the day such a success.
