Central Council Representative update following the AGM 2018 - by Alison Everett

Lancaster May 2018 was my first Central Council AGM as a territorial association Representative. I volunteered as a helper when the 2016 AGM was hosted in Portsmouth by our neighbours Winchester & Portsmouth Guild just over the western border of the Sussex Association and attended Edinburgh 2017 as a member of CRAG (the Central Council Review Action Group), so knew a bit what to expect, but it's quite different to our District or Association meetings, with over 200 representatives, speakers and local volunteers too.

Having the meeting on a University campus meant the lecture theatres, meeting rooms, catering facilities and accommodation was conveniently on one site, and it was organised by the Council in conjunction with the local Guild. The weekend's attractions included: The Lichfield Diocesan Mobile Belfry \circ The Carter Ringing Machine \circ The Woodhouse Ringing Machine \circ The CCCBR Roll of Honour \circ Bookstalls – ART and CCCBR. Seminars were provided on the following subjects: \circ Positive Public Relations \circ Are you Safe and Safeguarded? \circ Biographies: The Key to Ringing History \circ Kick start your Bell Restoration Project \circ Practical Belfry Maintenance \circ Youth Leadership Forum: Led by prominent Young Ringers. All ringers were invited to attend, and this format will continue, it is hoped, to promote understanding of and participation in the Council's varied activities.

The meeting papers were made available on the CCCBR website beforehand, so we had a chance read them, and there had been discussion in the Ringing World and social media. Since the Edinburgh meeting when a vote for reform of the Central Council was carried, a shadow Executive had been in place, running alongside the committees, and dedicated groups had been working on the Rules and Decisions, consulting widely and referring to the Charity Commission framework. At Lancaster there was much debate and amendments considered, but at the end of the day an 85% majority vote provided a strong endorsement of the work so far.

The new Workgroups are now in place, and whereas the equivalent positions in the committees were open only to elected Central Council representatives, the workgroups are open to all ringers. There is much work to be done over the next few months, but be assured, everything is being done to ensure that the Council becomes the organisation that we need it to be:

The strategic leader and public voice of the ringing community, the arbiter of standards; and to promote an environment where ringing can flourish.



Norwich Outing.

We decided to make the most of going to Norfolk, so after an early start we went for a walk around Sheringham Park with my cousin who lives in the area. Later we met some of the other ringers at Friday evening's tower at Horsham St. Faiths now a 9.cwt 6. There used to be three bells, but in 1553 they were reduced to one. Between 1610 and 1612 the one bell was replaced by four Bells, cast by the Brend family who owned a bell foundry near All Saints Green in Norwich. In 1868 the bells couldn't be rung because of a rotten bell frame and two of the bells were cracked, the major restoration of the church began in 1873 and six Bells were hung in a new frame, they were again restored in 1930 in memory of a church warden of fifty years William Warner Cook. We rang Rounds, Plain Bob Minor, Norwich and Grandsire.

Saturday was our busiest day, the first tower was Wroxham a 9.2 cwt 6, and we met some other Ringers who travelled up earlier in the morning. We nearly had a lock out here. After making a phone call the tower correspondent's husband answered the phone and said "Sorry my wife forgot to remind me, I'll be there in two minutes." After ringing up we had an enjoyable ring, the feature in the tower was a pulley to hold the ropes on, it was like a candelabra maybe used for their lighting in previous days, suggestion now is it could be their emergency lighting! Coltishall a 10cwt

6, they were slightly harder to ring. On the wall was the commandments of bell ringing. Marsham was our first ring of eight a 7.3 cwt. after a rest enjoying the sunshine in the church yard we went up the tower to start ringing. We were lucky here as the bells had been left up as there had been a meeting of the Norfolk Association earlier. These bells went very well. We all drove to Aylsham and wandered around the town finding places for a snack before ringing at Aylsham a 17.1 cwt ten, Grandsire caters was rung otherwise it was mainly Rounds, Call Changes and Plain hunt. Felmingham was a 15.3 cwt eight. In 1817 a peal of six was cast by Thomas Mears of London and hung by Thomas and Joshua Hurry of Norwich, to replace the pre-



vious ring of five. By 1857 the bells were in need of rehanging again, and the work was carried out by Thomas Edridge of Marsham. The Bertram Legacy enabled a restoration of the tower to take place in 1997, a new treble and tenor were added making a ring of eight, and the work was carried out by Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Part of the old oak frame in this tower dates back to 1684.

The last tower on Saturday was Erpingham an 8.3 cwt eight. When we got there the person that let us in had rung the tenor up, as it had a tendency to go up wrong, but we were also warned the one and two may go up wrong after a change of ringer on the two the bells were rung up, but the treble did go up wrong. These bells were quite hard work but we all managed to ring them. Think we were all glad Ringing was over for the day and we could go and find dinner somewhere.

Sunday morning everyone done their own thing walking or busing into Norwich and spending the morning exploring Norwich. We all met up at Coalgate a 9.cwt six, there was a room that used to be a priest's room that we waited in while some people rung. On to Coslany a 14.5 cwt eight, the back two bells were rung up separately, the tenor had to be turned over as up wrong, and the other six were rung up. These bells were hard work, we were told they need to be rehung. The church is now 'the oak circus centre', while we were waiting for our turn to ring we were able to look over the balcony on the mezzanine floor and see people practicing on the circus equipment. On our way to ring at St Giles a 13.2 eight, some of us stopped off for an ice cream or a drink in the park. We had a longish climb to the ringing floor where we had to ring the bells up. The tower of St Giles Church, is about 35 metres, its best admired from outside and is beautiful from many vantage points. Three of the bells date from 1430. On top of the tower is the cupola of 1737 which contains the clock bell. This takes the place of the beacon cresset now in the South aisle which dates from the 1497 will of Thomas Colton who was saved from drowning in the nearby marshes by the ringing of St. Giles' bells leading him to higher ground. He requested that the beacon be lit, and he provided a piece of land to pay for the Church's maintenance.

Our lightest tower of the tour, All Saints centre 5.cwt six. The church is now an antique centre, so between ringing people were wondering between the different stalls. The treble and tenor share the same rope guide, which can be a bit tricky to ring. We all made our own arrangements for dinner eating in different venues in Norwich, then a few of us walked back to the hotel along the disused railway and river, while others took the bus back.

Our last day Monday we rung at four towers all six Bells, Drayton 7.3 Cwt. Tony, who let us in at All Saints, lives next to the church, he called in to see us, we were also joined by Sandra and Jeremy Alford and Jeremy's sister. Weston Longville, 10.2 cwt. St Peters Church Yaxham, 12.1cwt. This was a round tower and built of flint. This was a ground floor ring, making is easier for us all to explore the church. Our last tower of the tour was Mattishall, 14 cwt, the bells

Safeguarding report.

So... have you thought about doing the Diocese of Chichester on line safeguarding training yet? Everyone involved with the church, in any way, should be aware of safeguarding and child protection issues.

Tower Captains and anyone involved with the training of young people or transporting young people must still complete the C1 and C2 training every 3 years. You can book yourself onto training Diocese of Chichester training courses. Or your parish safeguarding officer can arrange it for you.

And for everyone else there is the C0 on line training. It takes about an hour to complete.

Here's what to do ...

Go to

https://safeguarding.chichester.anglican.org

Click on 'training event'

On the left side of the page you will find E learning, which is what you need. At the bottom of the page is the safeguarding portal, which will take you to the on-line courses.

At this stage you will need to create a new account.

The course is 1 hour long. You are able to stop and start, go back over bits.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Currently, there is a lot of media coverage about historic abuse by church members, and particularly the response by the Diocese of Chichester to allegations that were made. Always, always believe what a young person may tell you and report what has been said to your parish safeguarding officer, to me, to the police. Keeping children safe is the responsibility of everyone.

Alison Everett (SCACR) -122 votes


David Smith (ANZAB) - 116 votes
