Monday Evening Practices - the Plan

- The first Monday in the month will be a six-bell practice and the second Monday an eightbell practice, varying between elementary level and advanced methods.
- The third Monday is the 10-bell methods practise using the Warnham simulator.
- The fourth Mondays are meant for 12 bell ringers and competent 10 bell ringers wishing to progress (from all districts), so we will only ring methods on 12 bells and not rounds or call changes. Keep your eye on the Facebook page, the website or contact Steph or Elaine to check which are suitable for you.
- Any fifth Mondays will be a general practice, mainly on 9 or 10 bells at Horsham.
- We look forward to welcoming **newer ringers** to the elementary level evenings. When you can handle a bell safely (without bumping the stay too often) and are ringing rounds and call changes at your home tower, come out and meet your fellow "improvers".

What's been happening in the District?

Annual Northern District Outing to Hampshire - Saturday 1st June

On the 1st June 2019 early in the morning, around 30 ringers from all over the District set off in cars for the annual Northern District ringing outing to Hampshire.

The weather was kind and it was a lovely drive into the beautiful Hampshire countryside, arriving around 9:00 at the first tower at St John the Baptist Purbrook. After a short



detour to find the car park my carload arrived early to find a number of the ringers already ringing up. The only problem at this tower was that although there was a toilet the lady in charge did not seem to have the correct code to let us in, so we had to ring with crossed legs! The bells were a 5 cwt 6, which were up a small set of stairs to a tiny ringing room; 6 people had to come down before 6 went up!



We then proceeded to the next tower and on the way me, Steph Tilley, Elaine Farrow and Ian Wiltshire stopped off for tea and coffee in the garden of a lovely Café in Denmead. On arrival at Soberton, we proceeded to St Peters Church a 13cwt 8 and a ground floor ring.

We left Soberton at 11:10 and travelled the short distance to St Barnabas, Stanmore a 6cwt 6. While waiting for turns to ring there was a cabinet of

stones next to the entrance on which children had obviously written what their hopes were. A large number seemed to want to be professional footballers, the proximity to Southampton and Portsmouth perhaps being relevant. The tower was also next to a café and the serving staff were interested in what the noise was and came to enquire, they were pleased I think to hear that the ringing would not be all day.

By 12 o'clock we were all ready for a drink and food, so we made our way to the Rising Sun Pub where we were able to sit in the garden before going in for our pre-ordered lunches, which had been ably managed by Jeremy Alford. After a few mis orders everyone was well fed and watered and ready for the afternoons ringing.

The first tower of the afternoon was St Nicholas, Bishops Sutton, a quant Norman Church built in the 12^{th} Century with a roman coffin outside. It is also a stop on the Pilgrims Way, the tower had a 7 cwt 5, allowing for those who have never rung on a 5 before a great opportunity for this experience.

Our penultimate tower was at St John the Evangelist, Northington, home

to Hampshire's newest 6! (6 cwt). The Church was very impressive being much more grand than would be expected in such a small village, it was learnt that 3 wealthy landowners had a competition as to who could build the biggest church in the area and Northington won. Some excellent ringing was had by all after a very long climb up to the ringing chamber thanks to the very tall tower.

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After a $\frac{1}{2}$ hour's drive to Whitchurch, we met in the Kudos café for tea and cake, I enjoyed a large slice of salted caramel and peanut butter cake, a right reward for a day's ringing. We then proceeded up the hill to our final tower of the day - All Hallows Whitchurch and 26 cwt 10. Another ground floor chamber the bells were very nice to ring and allowed for some good ringing to end the day.

Thanks go to the organisers, especially Jeremy Alford, for a very enjoyable day of ringing in the beautiful Hampshire countryside.

Sussex Young Ringers Compete in Liverpool - Josh Hutchison reports

I can safely report the Ringing World National Youth Contest trophy has safely made it to Liverpool and been handed to the new RWNYC champions, Oxford. Sadly we couldn't defend our title this year, and settled with a commendable 6th place. We stepped up this year and rang Grandsire Triples, making us one of only a few teams to ring a method out of the 24 competing teams.

We ventured up to Liverpool by train on Friday 5th and stayed two nights in a hotel over the whole weekend. The Friday night saw some of us head over to St Nicholas Pierhead for their weekly 12 bell practice, while others stayed at the Hotel for dinner. On Saturday we were lucky to be drawn to ring third, meaning we could spend the rest of the day tower grabbing in Liverpool! The competition tower was St Francis Xavier's; a beautiful Roman Catholic Church. We found the bells challenge, with some interesting acoustics, but our hard work and preparation meant we could produce some top striking on these bells. Our feedback from the judges after the results in the evening commended our solid speed and purpose, with small striking mistakes not detracting from the overall quality.

The rest of Saturday saw us grabbing towers around Liverpool such as the 8s at Penny Lane and Bootle. We also got another chance to ring at Pierhead, an absolutely fantastic 12. It was great to ring Grandsire cinques at Pierhead and show other teams our 12 bell skills. Some older ringers

doubt the skills of young ringers, but in Sussex we pride ourselves on being able to ring a variety of methods from 6 to 12 bells, and do it with confidence and skill.

The highlight for many was the chance to ring at Liverpool Cathedral after the competition results were announced. The Cathedral bells are the heaviest and highest in the world - It was a long way up! The experience of ringing these massive bells inside a huge ringing chamber, surrounded by 100s of young ringers, adults and friends, was astonishing.



The final result was a little disappointing, but we knew we gave it out all, and had done Sussex proud. We will be back next year (location tbc) to compete again and build on our ringing this year. Thanks to our coordinators, Anne and Sandra, and our supporters over the weekend. It was a blast!

The Codgers Ringing Group was started in the 1990's by George Francis from Warnham. This very friendly group is open to all ringers who can handle a bell confidently on their own and caters for all levels from Call Changes to Surprise Major.

Although predominately Sussex ringers, there are also ringers from Surrey, Hampshire and North of the Thames on the circulation list. We usually meet on the first Wednesday of the month unless there is a Bank Holiday such as New Year's Day in which case we will meet the following week. Two towers are visited, an eight bell tower in the morning and a six bell in the afternoon with a preordered lunch at a suitable pub in between. The towers can be anywhere in Sussex and the surrounding counties and we try to cover all areas over the year.

Details for each month are circulated by email on the Wednesday before along with a pub menu so that members can pre-order beforehand, hopefully reducing the time taken for lunch. At present the circulation list holds almost a hundred ringers although typically on the day maybe 20 to 30 ringers will attend. This is the wonderful thing about our hobby, it doesn't matter whether you are a beginner or have been ringing for longer than one cares to remember, there is always something new to learn. You may be struggling with bell control (why won't this rope do what I want it to?), call changes, embarking on method ringing (wow, bells all over the place) but rest assured, it doesn't matter who you are, we are all in the same boat.

It took months of practice for the 23-spliced to be achieved, starting with a quarter peal of 4 of them first, then 12, then consolidating those with a peal, building up to another peal of 20 of them, finally achieving all 23. There had been disappointments and lost attempts along the way but with perseverance and determination a good final peal was scored.

Ringing is great fun but can be so frustrating and easy to think you are the only one struggling. If you find yourself in this position, talk to your Tower Captain or a friend and I'm sure they'd reassure you it's perfectly normal to feel this way sometimes and can perhaps suggest different ways/techniques to overcome particular hurdles.

Congratulations to Jeremy Alford, Simon Alford, Stephen Beckingham, Jonathan Franklin, Simon Meyer, Alan Pink and David Smith on completing their challenge and to all those who are achieving firsts/conquering obstacles whatever they may be.

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Lindfield Bells are up and ringing- 'Finally' I hear you say! Sarah Beeston updates us




We celebrated the arrival of our new "Queen Elizabeth Bells' at All Saints on Friday May 3rd and they are beautiful! They were on display in the church over an extended weekend during which we welcomed lots of visitors, including a number of ringers, which was great.

During the following week Whites of Appleton and most of our band set about installing these bells, juggling the hours of work due to other activities in the church, including an organ recital and two funerals. You may have caught a glimpse of the bells rising to their new home and being put in place within a new frame if you were watching BBC South East News in early May. It was hard work and a tight fit, but the result is wonderful.

Owing to other work being done in the tower, such as access stairs and ladders, and the return and installation of the refurbished church clock - there was a further wait before ringing could begin. In fact, our first practice took place on Tuesday July 16th and our first Sunday ring on the 28th.
