Well here we are again, nearly to the long school holidays. I expect many of you will be called upon to entertain younger members of your family, as we will, or be enjoying your gardens in the sunshine with a Pimm's!

Since the last Sally Forth we have had our Striking Contest in April, this year at Angmering. Although it was a rather rainy afternoon outside the church filled up with various members of different Towers (5 in all) waiting to take their turn at ringing Angmering's recently refurbished bells. It all went very slickly and by 4pm we were all sitting down enjoying a sumptuous tea laid on by the local ringers. We let the judges also have their tea before announcing the results. All teams had rung well, with no trip ups, and to keep it all on a friendly basis no points were announced just places. The winning team overall was Goring and the Novice winning team was Chichester. Thank you to everyone who took part and hopefully you found it a rewarding and fun experience working with other members of your team to produce some well struck ringing. Hopefully next year we will have some other Towers have a go.

May's monthly 'Get-together' was a shared event with the South to ring on the 12 bells at East Grinstead. Unfortunately, no one turned up for this, as other events were also taking place. June was at Stedham and Milland. There was only 8 of us but we made good use of the bells at Stedham, ringing Bob Doubles & Minor, Grandsire, and a course of Cambridge. The weather couldn't make up its mind whether to be brilliant sunshine or showers, so although the sun was shining when we got to Milland the ground was too wet to sit on for our picnic. We therefore ate in the church. A couple of the other ringers had not been able to come on to Milland but a couple of others joined us so a different 8 of us once again rang more or less the same methods as before on Milland's bells. Graham and I then started our trek home and the heavens opened with very heavy rain making driving on the country roads quite daunting especially when you are not too sure of the way, but we made it after what seemed a very long journey.

These Saturday's are put on for all of you to come and ring and socialise with other ringers. It is especially good if you are a new ringer as it is an opportunity to get to know other ringers who may well be at the same stage as yourself, swap stories and experiences and then ring and get help from any other experienced ringers who are there. The ringing consists of anything from Call Changes, upwards according to the skill of the ringers attending. Get a member of your Tower to come with you, as we all know how daunting it can be stepping into a strange Tower and then being faced with a load of strangers. The first time is always the worst and then each time you will tend to see the same faces and therefore make friends. This is the way forward with ringing as the more practice you can get, the better your ringing will become and, if you ask, experienced ringers are always happy to help by either explaining something you are struggling with or by standing with you whilst you ring..

Our learning to ring up and down course held at Shipley in June was very popular and was oversubscribed. We will be running another one in due course for learning to ring up and down, probably in the New Year. However, there is an afternoon to practice ringing up and down in peal for those who can confidently and safely ring up and down on their own. This is in September at Aldingbourne and once again will be limited in the number of students, so you get several goes. This is something that is not mastered quickly and needs lots of practice. 

Sussex Young Ringers Compete in Liverpool



I can safely report the Ringing World National Youth Contest trophy has safely made it to Liverpool and been handed to the new RWNYC champions, Oxford. Sadly we couldn't defend our title this year, and settled with a commendable 6th place. We stepped up this year and rang Grandsire Triples, making us one of only a few teams to ring a method out of the 24 competing teams.

We ventured up to Liverpool by train on Friday 5th and stayed two nights in a hotel over the whole weekend. The Friday night saw some of us head over to St Nicholas Pierhead for their weekly 12 bell practice, while others stayed at the Hotel for dinner.





On Saturday we were lucky to be drawn to ring third, meaning we could spend the rest of the day tower grabbing in Liverpool! The competition tower was St Francis Xavier's; a beautiful Roman Catholic Church. We found the bells challenging, with some interesting acoustics, but our hard work and preparation meant we could produce some top striking on these bells. Our feedback from the judges after the results in the evening commended our solid speed and purpose, with small striking mistakes not detracting from the overall quality. The rest of Saturday saw us grabbing towers around Liverpool such as the 8s at Penny Lane and Bootle. We also got another chance to ring at Pierhead, an absolutely fantastic 12. It was great to ring Grandsire cinques at Pierhead and show other teams our 12 bell skills. Some older ringers doubt the skills of young ringers, but in Sussex we pride ourselves on being able to ring a variety of methods from 6 to 12 bells, and do it with confidence and skill.

The highlight for many was the chance to ring at Liverpool Cathedral after the competition results were announced. The Cathedral bells are the heaviest and highest in the world – It was a long way up! The experience of ringing these massive bells inside a huge ringing chamber, surrounded by 100s of young ringers, adults and friends, was astonishing. The final result was a little disappointing, but we knew we gave it our all, and had done Sussex proud. We will be back next year (location tbc) to compete again and build on our ringing this year.

Thanks to our coordinators, Anne and Sandra, and our supporters over the weekend. It was a blast!

Keith Game 1943 – 2019Chichester Cathedral ringer and Steeple Keeper



Keith was born in Redhill on 11th March 1943 and learnt to ring at Reigate in 1957, ringing his first peal in 1961. He left school at 18 and started work in the Home Office in the Nationality and Immigration Department. He moved to Selsey in 1974 to help look after his mother and stepfather, commuting to London via bus and train. It was in 1974 that he joined the Chichester Cathedral band and was a loyal Sunday service ringer, serving as Steeple Keeper there for many years. In 1996 he took early retirement to look after his mother, by then an invalid. She passed away in 1999.

Keith was elected to the Ancient Society of College Youths in 1978 and rang 46 peals for the Society, conducting 3 of them. He enjoyed a number of ringing tours, including "Pipe's Pilgrims" tours from 1968 to 1973, Tom Lock's Peal tours 1975 to 2006, then Ireland in 1980, Australia and New Zealand in 1988 and the ASCY tours to Canada in 2000 and Australia and New Zealand in 2003. He also visited friends in Zimbabwe every year from 1991 to 2001, joining them for their AGM ringing. He rang 657 peals in total, his last being Stedman Triples in 2014.

Keith was diagnosed with terminal cancer in January this year and sadly passed away on the 6th June in Westhampnett Nursing Home, Chichester, aged 76.

Angmering & Findon's Surrey Outing 25th May 2019

In the coming weeks or months and we ask ourselves "When was our outing?", we can say it was 2 days after the European elections nobody wanted, the day of the Manchester United legends match and the start of the Cricket World Cup. Organised by Caroline Jones with Barbara Harbut who unfortunately was unable to be with us on the day, we travelled mostly independently. Four of us went in a Moonraker campervan called 'James' (Bond, of course), and it seemed that nearly every inn we passed through Surrey brought back wistful memories of days long gone for at least two of us!



There was more than one car park in Church Street, DORKING and as we approached St Martin's (10) 18-1-18 (see left) we saw a peregrine falcon up on the steeple plucking the feathers from an unfortunate wood pigeon which were falling like snowflakes. Inside, the sallies were a striking yellow. The heavy bells were raised first, then the front eight in peal. It was good to have all our recent learners with us, so, after choosing suitable bells we rang rounds on six, then increased to eight and finally included all ten. Our second effort was well struck producing a beautiful sound and a noticeable sway on the tower. A feature on the wall is a photograph of A. Patrick Cannon (1914-1982) with whom Caroline, leading us in the morning, rang a peal at Warnham in 1973.

A small market was on at BANSTEAD All Saints (8) 21-0-27 and the only space available for us in the car park was next to the jet car wash, in line for all the stray spray. By the end of the morning we had an unasked for but only half-clean camper van. A little bit late, the four of us scrambled over the churchyard wall to be caught by my sister-in-law coming to hear us ring. These bells were a comfortable peal provided you used long pulls and kept the backstrokes in! There was time for rounds and Grandsire Doubles.

The back roads off the North Downs took us through Hooley where part of 'Four Weddings and a Funeral' was filmed, disregarding protests from our Satnav and checking direction by the sun, to LIMPSFIELD. A number of noted musicians are buried here, including Delius, and this

was where the BBC broadcast a cello accompanied by the song of a nightingale in 1934. After lunch, we ascended St Peter's (6) 14-3-16 by steep wooden ladders to the clock room immediately below the bells. They had been raised for us and we achieved rounds and call changes, Grandsire and our first Plain Bob Minor.

Swallows greeted us at OXTED St Mary's (6) 12-0-2. We climbed first to a choir loft, then up a beautiful wooden spiral staircase, 30 steps in all, until we were under the bells again. A peal board in the tower, dated 1985, recorded a ring of 5040 changes of doubles methods including Kennington (a variation of Plain Bob) and Southrepps (a variation of Reverse Canterbury). These bells had a heavy feel and were hard for some of us to set. However, after our usual ringing we stood the bells at back. This was to enable us to be given a demonstration of the ringing simulator they have built, mostly from acquired parts, which can be used to train up to three starting ringers simultaneously and silently, or advanced learners on the more difficult methods.

On to LIMPSFIELD CHART St Andrew's (6) 10-1-21, passing blue flowers in the roadside verges, to find we had to climb the rungs of an outside iron ladder (as demonstrated by Shirley Hamilton) to reach the ringing chamber. Helen Bickers took us capably through the afternoon which we finished with an excellent touch of Grandsire. A board displaying rules for ringers from a past age admonished us in Rule No. 9 "All ringers shall be present on all High Days viz: - King's Ascension, Easter Sunday, Ascension day evening service, WhitSunday, Coronation Day or pay one shilling fine each service except Easter Sunday evening and WhitSunday evening when the usual time for ringing will be 35 mins and the fine 6d". The circle here was oval, with



the treble out to one side giving a particularly good view of the rest of the band. Outside we took photographs:



As we headed south and passed others going the same way, we shut down the annoying Satnav. Behind 'The Orchard' restaurant on the Cowfold Road where we ended the day was the old railway track with a derelict signal, sidings and a converted carriage from the former West Grinstead railway station. It has now been restored as a cycle path and wildlife haven. Thankyou Caroline and Helen for making our day run so smoothly, and if we could have done with a few more elite ringers in the company, it was good for those less experienced to have had several successful rings at each tower.

Striking Competition at Walberton 13th April

Not everyone likes any form of competition when it comes to bell ringing. Trying a new tower with lots of people around that you may have not met before can be stressful enough but to think you are being judged by some experienced ringer hidden away in a car or adjacent vicarage drawing room can reduce some to a jelly of nerves! In the case of Jan from Chichester it was a nose-bleed!

This year we were at Angmering St Margaret's Church with 6 bells that had recently been refurbished under the watchful eye of Graham Hills, so he was capable of assessing their suitability for all abilities to be a safe and comfortable ring with no surprises. Even the 13cwt tenor was great to ring.

On a bright and sunny afternoon on 13th April, we had five teams waiting for Moya Hills to give us the rules and organise the draw for ringing order. We sat in the church looking at the two big wide-screen tv.screens attached to the chancel arch, like waiting for the performance order of "Euro-Vision!" Other friends joined us to make a total of about 40 people waiting for the action.

St Margaret's has had a lot of investment in recent years with new hardwood floors, including a sunken immersion pool, a large entrance area, new seating, a sound and vision system and of course the generous community lounge across the churchyard with kitchen attached where our tea awaited us.



First to ring was the Washington band whose least experienced ringer, Freya, was the one most keen to compete (that's what we like to see). Two minutes of rounds and changes are allowed for getting used to the bells, then two pulls mark the start of the competitive section with a maximum of one minute for rounds once more. This is followed by 5 minutes of changes which must include "queens", "tittums" and reverse rounds and a return to rounds again. It all sounds a bit technical but most directing the ringing know the drill and Washington, having Christine in charge, were in good hands.

The Chichester band were next and included three people recruited under the "Ringing Remembers" campaign which had done a lot to attract learners to this tower. As a result, they were classed as a novice band. Colin Spencer directed the changing and they managed well, even though they are more used to considerably longer ropes!





Lyminster St Mary's followed them up the stairs to defend what they considered to be "their" trophy which was won last year by Walberton with a 50% Lyminster contingent. I had the honour of the calling with one eye on the clock and the other watching the ropes, we settled into our program of rounds and changes. It was soon over and

....the next band from Goring were waiting to go up and follow us.

This was a mixed band again which is permitted, and had ringers from Heene and Tarring to make up the numbers. We were all impressed as they sailed through their repertoire without a single "bunny hop" moment (perhaps these should be introduced as compulsory!). There was justifiable applause as they came back down after ringing and I felt sympathy for



the final band of Steyning who had to follow them. They did not need to worry and rang really well providing a suitable finale to the competition ring before a brief interval for the judges to sort out the order and sign off the certificates.

After team photos outside of the west door, we all moved across the churchyard for our very welcome tea which the local church ladies had prepared. For some, you would think this is the main reason for coming as they delved into sandwiches, flans, cakes, sausage rolls and biscuits washed down with tea and coffee in abundance. The raffle was called by Moya raising £58-00 for the bell-fund and our judges, Alan and Christine Baldock, came in to give the results. Outside the heavens opened and rain came pouring down, accentuating our nerves!

Change ring judging can get very technical with some marking of faults on a line by line basis, taking a lot of time and a calculator, but Moya had asked Christine to only give general comments as

the range of ringing competence had been large. Christine referred to Steve Coleman's opinion of striking competitions saying that he was generally against them as they can create disappointment and the feeling of failure. Instead of highlighting individual errors, she referred to the way the bands had used the warm-up period, the speed and the rhythm of ringing and the way it makes people concentrate on their striking when using other people's bells for the first time.

The results were given in reverse order. This is where those big "Euro-Vision" screens would have been useful to build up the drama! Chichester were awarded the Novice Trophy and Goring the Harry Butler Trophy as overall winners. They were followed by Lyminster, Steyning, Chichester and Washington bands. Really we all won even if it was only over our anxiety!

Thanks to Moya and Graham for organizing our afternoon, all of you who came along to battle with their nerves and the bells, the ladies of Angmering who really did us proud and to Christine and Alan who so graciously deliberated on the delicate task of judging without sending any ringers away to cry into their pillows!

One of the pleasures of being tower captain at Arundel, St Nicholas' Church, is the chance to get involved with the Arundel Castle events. In addition to the regular pre-Christmas ringing this year, the request came through for their three bells to be rung for the christening of the Duke's grand-daughter, Flora on 17th March.

There is some novelty in ringing bells at a castle and as they are rung rarely and numerous people have been "entertained" up in the little stone chamber positioned half way along the corridor to the old keep. Some ringers have travelled many miles to "bag" this unusual venue but I was running out of locals willing to battle with this limited set of bells.

It was fortunate that Rick and Val Clay were keen to help out as Rick knew the Castle well but not the bells, so with Sylvia Hartigan who had been trusted with the code to the entrance door locks, we made our way through the outer defences and across the grounds towards this amazing bastion of stone. The trees were coming into fresh leaf, the daffodils were dancing in the gentle breeze and the sun shone warmly, in contrast to our winter ringings which always took place in the cold and dark!

Once across the bridge and under the portcullis, we walked into the inner bailey where we found three young lady tourists who asked us how to explore the castle buildings! Unfortunately, it was not open to the public for another two weeks, and Richard, the Castle Butler, came running out and shepherded them back the way they had come wandering in through the park and St Marys' Gate. (How can you hope to make a castle completely secure?)

After receiving our instructions from Richard, we made our way up to the small ringing chamber to ring up and then work away to earn our tea and a generous gratuity. A broken ceiling boss made the treble a struggle and was shedding the top of the sally but we took it in turns to try each bell and worked away for about 20 minutes.

I had commented to Richard about the state of the treble bell sally and offered to return and provide remedial works if he could arrange for a ladder. With the castle about to open in two weeks, I wanted to do the work without the complication of jostling with the public, so I followed up our visit a week later and removed the broken boss. Inspection of the bells revealed the poor condition of the wheels and badly rusted ironwork. Clearly, a visit by bell engineers was becoming urgent and I was able to offer the names of two consultants which I was promised would be followed up.

My other suggestion of the provision of a fourth bell to celebrate the arrival of little Flora was perhaps wishful thinking and a desire to bring to an end the struggle with "three blind mice" each Christmas!
