Return to Ringing or Not? Updated guidance from the Central Council (30th November, by Simon Linford, CCCBR President)

From the CCCBR news story:

First the good news and perhaps the light at the end of the tunnel for other areas. Just before we went into lockdown for the second time a month ago, we had reached agreement with the House of Bishops Recovery Group to drop down to 1m+ distancing, and then introduce local risk assessment based on the characteristics of the ringing environment and also risk assessment based on personal circumstances. Our guidance is that in Tier 1 this can now happen, although at first we only recommend ringing for 15 minutes until ventilation in towers is better understood. However, look to the end of this statement for our plans in that regard.

In Tiers 2 [East and West Sussex are both Tier 2] and 3 we are still recommending that we stick to the government's guidance that is the same for both Tiers, and that is that "No mixing of households indoors, apart from support bubbles." As was discussed when the lockdown started, one can argue the definitions of mixing, interacting and mingling, some might even try and argue that ringing is an act of worship or even employment, but the clear intention of the public health experts is to reduce interactions as much as possible so that we get through the winter without another wave of infection. That restricts ringing in Tiers 2 and 3 to families that live together and other households, or the ringing of single bells as currently.

Handbells

In Tier 1 we revert to the 'Rule of 6' which allows six people to meet indoors or outdoors, so handbell ringing is possible (but stay distanced and ventilate well). In Tier 2 a maximum of six people can meet in any outdoor setting only, including a domestic garden, so socially distanced handbell ringing is viable. Tier 3: mixing of households outdoors needs to be in a public space, e.g. parks, public gardens or churchyards. This give the opportunity to meet perhaps outside the church and ring handbells. You should not travel from a higher tier to a lower tier for ringing.

Great fun was had by all, and excellent progress made by the learners, on the SCACR's first ever online ringing course. Seven learners and ten helpers assembled on Zoom on the morning of Saturday 14th November, ready to tackle Plain Hunt Doubles. The learners had varying degrees of tower bell experience, ranging from just starting out on Plain Hunt to being able to call simple touches of Doubles methods.

The session started with everyone introducing themselves. Anne Franklin then explained the basic theory, after which we split into two groups to practise on Ringing Room (many of the helpers were strangely delighted at the opportunity to "bag" a new virtual tower!).

After lots of laughter, and more than a couple of instances of some of the "helpers" going wrong (particularly yours truly!), the leaners had mastered ringing an inside bell to Plain Hunt Doubles. Some paused for a coffee break and a chat at half-way, others were super-keen and continued ringing. By the end of the session, all the learners had successfully rung the treble to Grandsire Doubles. Many thanks to all the helpers, and congratulations to all the learners on their fantastic progress!

Why, When, Where and How? Interviews with ...

This series of interviews by Stephanie Pendlebury turns the spotlight on individual ringers. This time she shines a light on Gerald Sandwell and Karen and Stephen Prowse.



Gerald Sandwell, Worth

Gerald Sandwell is a past Master (1989-92 - and he still blames Peter Hurcombe for that!) and Honorary Life Member of the Association

When and where did you start ringing?

I started ringing at Thorpe Bay in Essex. They had a brand-new Taylors' ring of 8 when we moved there in 1947. I started ringing there in 1948.

Where do you ring now? Worth

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How did you get into ringing?

In the middle of the war, we lived in a little village in Norfolk. I was sent off to boarding school aged 7 or 8. My father learned to ring for VE day, and never rang again afterwards! We were always moving, and I was often in the church choir. My voice broke when we were in Thorpe Bay, and my father suggested that I took up ringing.

There was a very nice band, with quite a few young people. While I was learning there, Frank Lufkin (the tower captain at the nearby 10-bell tower, Prittlewell) took me to one side one day and told me he wanted to see me at the Prittlewell practice - he took me under his wing. We formed a group called the Southend and District Guild, with about 12 churches and a lot of youngsters - as a lad, I was Master of that guild for a year. I moved to Sussex in 1972.

What do you like most about ringing?

One of the things that I enjoy is actually listening to the music of good striking - I can stand for hours listening to good ringing. It's very nice to be part of it, but I also admire listening to it. I like the music of triples; I used to ring a lot of spliced triples. I also enjoy it because it's a service to the church, and all my life I have been involved in serving the church, one way or another. And wherever you go, worldwide, you can meet up with other ringers.

What do you find most challenging?

Learning and retaining advanced or intricate methods. I have found over the years that you have to make time to do this, and you have to get out and practise elsewhere, not just at your own tower.

Who do you get inspiration from/What inspires you?

I have done an awful lot of teaching - I do enjoy teaching ringing. I was Education Officer for the Association for some time; during that time, I helped to develop the Association Ringing Course. I get a tremendous kick out of seeing any learner, but youngsters particularly, making progress, and having had something to do with helping that.

Karen & Stephen Prowse, East Grinstead



When and where did you start ringing? Karen & Stephen - July 2015, Caterham St Mary's in Surrey

Where do you ring now?

We will ring at East Grinstead, when we're allowed to, but also ring at Coleman's Hatch and some of our old Surrey haunts. We haven't had the chance to ring at many Sussex towers because as soon as we moved here the lockdown started.

How did you get into ringing?

We went to a churchyard for a cup of tea and cake, which had a sign up for an open day and we went up the belltower to watch a demonstration. Stephen asked to have a go, but they wouldn't let him! We thought it would be really easy and you'd just pull a rope. But they told us to come back on Friday night for practice night, which we did, and the rest is history. We became more and more obsessed with it, and it took over our lives somewhat.

What do you like most about ringing?

Stephen - I like learning a new method and then ringing a quarter peal of it, and also going on outings with several towers and a pub lunch.

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Karen - the fun and the chat and meeting people, and also the outings - I love to go to pretty villages and look round the church buildings.

What do you find most challenging?

Stephen - striking, and ringers' attitudes to striking. The emphasis on perfect or near-perfect striking; some people can be a bit rude about this, and the obsession with perfection can take the fun out of ringing.

Karen - I can get stressed and feel out of my depth very easily, so feeling like being put on the spot, for example when ringing new methods is challenging.

Who do you get inspiration from/What inspires you?

Stephen - I'm very competitive, so I'm inspired by doing things before someone else can! Karen - I look forward to visiting and ringing at other towers in Sussex.
