## District Meeting at St Giles, Graffham $12^{\text {h }}$ March 2022

The morning started cold but sunny, and the advice on the church noticeboard to "wear a Sunday vest under your Sunday best" was definitely wise. Nevertheless, it was a pleasant drive along the Downs with signs of spring everywhere, including a pair of Red Kites.

Approximately 20 ringers gathered, including the vicar of Graffham who revealed that she was a lapsed ringer - a situation that didn't last long and she rang very
 competently.


David Kirkcaldy organised the ringing which ranged from rounds to the finale of Cambridge Surprise Minor via plain hunt, Plain Bob, Grandsire and Stedman.

Graffham is a ground floor ring which is perfect for the all-important ventilation, but does make it difficult to run a practice as ringers tend to slope off into corners making the organiser's task challenging at times (there is none so deaf as a group of ringers in deep conversation).

Fuelled by coffee and cake at half time, the ringing was of a good standard with David making sure that all learners had a strong band around them plus a
 "stander behinder". The "strong band" did prove to be a bit rusty when it came to Stedman and Cambridge, showing that the pandemic has affected ringing at all levels. ## Wedding Ring

With the Covid restrictions now reduced, a host of deferred weddings have descended and once again tower captains are hustling around to draw in local bands of ringers.

Spare a thought for the work that they must undertake to ensure that the big day goes with a swing (or more accurately a ring). Firstly, the exact date and time has to be established. Do they really want bells? Which day of the week and do they mean 4.00 pm ? Will it be a long service with unusual dedications? It will be up to you of course to make sure the bells are all up and in good order well before the big day and not at the last minute in a clumsy panic.

First requests for ringers can often be negative. It may be holiday time, there may be weddings at other churches that day, an Association meeting or friends visiting. (or even "I'm not sure so can't commit at this time.") All reasonable to the individual but a frustration for your tower captain.

Once a band has been sorted, the problems still continue. We only ring now after the ceremony to save people having to sit through the proceedings after the sometimes late arrival of the bride. She may then have a photographic session around the lych gate followed by a slow procession towards the church. At earlier times I had a small colour camera mounted high in the tower to monitor her progress which had variable success in sunny weather in deciding between the white of the bride and the seagulls and pigeons roosting on the roof!

Hopefully your ringers will have arrived on time allowing for traffic conditions, level crossings, diversions and local events. "Oh I thought the wedding started at the time that you said and so l've come a half hour later", is little compensation when you arrive at the church to find only two other ringers present. (time to get on the mobile and try to rustle up some local assistance which may backfire when you are faced with surplus ringers after everyone arrives five minutes later!

Once in the ringing chamber, and hopefully with a copy of the service program, ropes have to be allocated and some form of contact established with the proceedings below. Originally we had to use a little helper (prone to running off or if older forgetting altogether or falling asleep.), to give us the signal to ring as we are remote from the altar. Now a black and white cctv system helps provided the bride is in white and there is a helpful hymn to finish. We usually ring for about 15 to 20 minutes depending on how late the bride was, and then it is time to ring down and divide out the remuneration. This is another duty of the captain. He must have the money beforehand so that each ringer can walk away without debt or favour to be redeemed at a later date. (Vicars can be a little forgetful or when it comes it can be in the form of an envelope of $£ 20$ notes not divisible into 6).


It is always a relief and a pleasure to find that on leaving the church, the gathering by the gate of bride and groom, friends and relatives are still enjoying their special day. A lot of hard work, planning and hope goes into the wedding and I still get a buzz from feeling that we have played our part in launching the happy couple on the seas of matrimony.

## June Get Together

What better way to spend a sunny June afternoon than in the beautiful West Sussex countryside ringing at two of our six bell towers. Saturday, 11 June, saw a select group at Stedham for an hour's ringing; it was good to see some of our newer ringers present along with some more familiar faces. There was the opportunity for concentration on practice of recently learnt methods before refreshments sitting and chatting in the sunshine.

We then moved onto Midhurst for further ringing, after some grappling with the parking ticket machine everyone made it to the ringing chamber for further ringing to cater for those present. It was really good to see, in addition to some new faces, our new Association Master; Gareth Higgs and his wife present. Also we had a comment that we were at towers on the far west of the District.

A very enjoyable afternoon and Janice even made a Victoria sponge, delicious!

Everyone too busy ringing to take photos but editor found these snippets on the internet:


St Mary Magdalene and St Denys, Midhurst. Until the Reformation, the church was a chapelry to Easebourne Priory, with the chaplain appointed by the Prioress of the Benedictine nuns. Records show that in 1390 the Prioress, Margery Pygon, gave leave for Nicholas, Chaplain of Midhurst, to be buried beneath the bell tower, before the altar of the Blessed Mary, in the Chapel of St Mary Magdalene of Midhurst.
The name St Denys was added sometime in the sixteenth century and is likely to have some connection with the de Bohum family (owners of Cowdray Castle). Little is known of St Denys, traditionally acknowledged to be patron saint of France, except that he was the first Bishop of Paris and suffered martyrdom in the third century.

St James is the main church in the parish of Stedham with Iping. It is situated on an ancient site, which is believed to have been a place of worship from preChristian times. There is a yew tree in the churchyard that is approximately two thousand five hundred years old. There has been a Christian church in Stedham for well over a thousand years. The present building is largely Victorian - with the exception of the tower which is on Saxon foundations and was restored in the seventeenth century. There is a fine peal of six bells, and the oldest bells date from 1618.

Back at the beginning of April this year I was asked to speak at a bell ringing event in Yorkshire; the subject was the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers. This was in my role as Deputy President of that organisation. For those of a certain age who remember the Monty Python film The Life of Brian I based what I said on, ' What has the Central Council done for us?'; rather than the Romans.

One of the services offered by the Central Council that I covered was with regards to publications. There is a whole range of books on many ringing topics; One Per Learner books, Manual of Belfry Maintenance and the New Ringer's Handbook to mention a few of the most popular. Where would be without Dove's Guide to tick off all those new towers in?

Titles are regularly updated and revised where necessary, one of the latest to undergo a revision is WILL YOU CALL A TOUCH PLEASE BOB. This was originally written by Sussex ringer Peter Hurcombe and is described as a beginner's guide to conducting. Does your tower lack a ringer who can call touches, let alone put others right when they go wrong? Have you wished that you could call touches, quarters or peals? This may be the book to set you on the path to putting the bobs in.
