THE NORTHERN DISTRICT NEWS

Operation London Bridge

On Thursday 8th September, we heard the devastating news that our beloved late monarch Queen Elizabeth II passed away peacefully. Not only was she the Queen, but she was the nation's grandmother and our longest reigning monarch. The editor heard about this shortly after a quarter peal at Petworth that evening. Operation London Bridge soon went into action and muffles were



put on. Where possible, towers nation wide fully muffled their bells with the tenor open at backstroke. This has not long been performed at Kirdford for the passing of their late vicar.

As the announcement of her passing was after 18:00, towers rang at noon the following day, 9th September. In the Northern the ringing for each tower is listed below:

ARDINGLY, St Peter: Forewarned of the requirements of 'Operation London Bridge' and, like many other towers, either already ill-prepared with another set of muffles or too parsimonious to purchase another set, I set about creating a set from old carpet and cable ties. These I placed with our original set and duly awaited 'the call'. When that sad occasion arose, I realised with trepidation that I had not tried my bodged set in anger and was somewhat alarmed when the cable ties were too short for very secure fitting, but fit they did and all I could do was hope they'd stay the course. I am very pleased to report that St. Peter's ringers, assisted by some of our ringing friends from neighbouring districts, rang our bells, fully muffled, on Friday morning, 9 th September after which we proceeded to West Hoathly and rung half muffled there. On the day of the funeral, having tolled the tenor the requisite 96 times in the morning, we rang a Quarter Peal of Stedman, Grandsire and Plain Bob Doubles, again assisted by local ringing friends to supplement our three available members. It was a strange, but evocative sound ringing bells this way – something I suspect very few ringers who are active today have ever done before, and quite possibly none have done so with the assistance of bits of carpet and cable ties! CRAWLEY, St John the Baptist: 9/9/2022 Tolled tenor 96 times; Continental ringing on back 2 and God Save the Queen on Ellacombe. 10/9/2022 Jump Changes rung open on Ellacombe. 11/9/2022 Rang open using Ellacombe by the ringers.
18/9/2022 Rounds & Call Changes for the Civic service followed by Tolling to call the 1 minute silence. 19/9/2022 Rounds and call changes fully muffled on 1,2,3,4,6,8.
CUCKFIELD, Holy Trinity: 19/9/2022 Half muffled before Queen Elizabeth II funeral. Tolling 96 strokes. Treble (20 strokes) - Jennifer Constable; 2 (18 strokes) Tessa Brown; 4 (20 strokes) - Libby Shead; 5 (18 strokes) - Linda Chapman; 6 (20 strokes) James Brenchley.

DANEHILL, All Saints: 9/9/2022 Rounds & Call Changes, rung half muffled.19/9/2022 Rounds & Call Changes and Tolling.

EAST GRINSTEAD, St Swithun: 9/9/2022 96 Tolls rung half muffled. First stroke rung by the Mayor of East Grinstead. 11/9/2022 30 mins of Rounds & Call Change rung on open bells to commemorate the proclamation of King Charles III at 3pm; 30 mins of Rounds & Call Changes rung fully muffled from the civic service; Rounds of 10 and Call Changes on 8. 19/9/2022 Fully muffled Rounds & Call Changes. Coronation of King Charles III

King Charles III's coronation will be held on **May 6th 2023**. Many towers have sent out notices about this event asking if new people would like to pick up the art of ringing to commemorate this event. There is still time to teach new ringers to get them to a confident level of handling to mark this event.

This could also be a great opportunity for towers to ring a Quarter Peal or even a Peal!

Following the Proclamation of the King, many towers rang for this as shown above - Rang open on the day if possible.



Seage's Apparatus week at Crawley

Crawley, St John the Baptist holds what is believed to be the last remaining fully working Seage's Apparatus in the world! In case you are wondering what one actually is, it is an installation in the tower which enables us to silence the bells but still manage to hear what you are ringing by small hang bells on the wall. In short, it is a mechanical simulator.

How does it work?



Once you have silenced the bell, you need to slot the Seage's rocking arm on to the receiver. A roller fixed to the side of the headstock comes in contact with the rocking arm and it triggers the receiver, this pulls a cable. At the other end of this cable is a handbell on the wall with a clapper. The handbells ring in the key of C and are cast by Mears & Stainbank except for the 3rd which is Gillett, Bland & Co.

We are planning on getting this apparatus ringing again and are thinking of holding a Seage's apparatus week once or maybe a few times each year. In the week, some days will be general ringing on them and then the others will allow you to ring a quarter on them ranging from Doubles to Major.

Turners Hill, St Leonard fall silent

The band at Turners Hill stopped ringing in March 2022. But during the mourning period of our late Queen Elizabeth II, they had the opportunity to ring! Each day at 12:00 noon from Friday 9th to Monday 19th, the tenor was tolled by Suzi Burns, Sarah O'Neil, Sarah Hamilton, Penny Furner, Jo Barnes, Helen Jones, Archie O'Neil. The bells are a complete Mears 8. The back 6 were hung in 1924 in an 8 bell frame leaving 2 empty for the 2 trebles to come. A peal was rung before the augmentation of Minor containing 7 methods. In 1926, two trebles were added and a peal of Superlative Surprise Major was rung to commemorate the augmentation.

To date, 172 peals have been rung on then, the last in August 2019 of Double Norwich court bob Major. The bells are ground floor ring and with a long but guided draft.

The Vicar and wardens love and miss the bells but they cannot be rung for the safety inspector has not assessed the bells.

So far, Turners Hill has a small







group of ringers but no one to look after the ringing and tower. It would be fantastic for these bells to end their silence and be rung regularly again!

Golden Wedding Anniversary at Ardingly

Sunday Service ringing on Sunday 9th October was a special occasion as the weekend marked the Golden Wedding Anniversary of the Tower Captain, Lynn Wilson and his wife, Pat who were married on 7th October, 1972 at St. Bartholomew's Church, Burstow, Surrey where they were both ringers. Alfriston, St Andrew


In January, the 6 bells at Alfriston, St Andrew's were lowered and taken away by Whites of Appleton Church Bell Hangers for restoration. They returned in August this year. They were painted with graphite to protect the bells, news fitting were given and the canon on the 3rd was removed. Also a new rope guide was installed Throughout the 20th century, Mears & Stainbank recast the front 5. The 3rd in 1908; 2,4 & 5 in 1928 and the treble in 1955. The old inscriptions were made in facsimile. The tenor remains original dating back to around 1400. In 1928, the 5th was stepped down and preserved in the church and Mears cast them a new one. The old 5th was restored by Whites of Appleton and is now the service bell. The bell is surprisingly light weight for its size, weighing just 3³/₄! The inscriptions of the bells read:

The ornaments

Fig. 1 was used by Mears & Stainbank in their last years before it was changed to The Whitechapel Bell foundry. The initials stand for Albert Arthur Hughes, Willian Arthur Hughes and Douglas Hughes. Fig. 2 was used earlier that Fig. 1 and RA/H stands for Robert Artur Hughes who left the business and his brother William became a partner in the business.

Fig. 3 & 4 were both used by William Wodeward. 3 is a 6-pointed cross with a fleur de lis at the end of each and 4 is a 10-spoked wheel.

The tenor has quite beautiful letters used and the words WOX and AVRO are spelling mistakes of VOX and AVRE. The Latin phrase means The voice of Augustine sounds in the ears of God. Aside from the tenor, the 5th has the most interesting inscription being that the majority of the letters are reversed and some are upside down. The B in HOMENBUS is upside down.



A new online guide for Steeple Keepers!

The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers (CCCBR) has released a new website called **Belfry Upkeep**. This handy document is aimed at the Steeple Keeper - the one responsible for keeping the bells in order.



You may be an established Steeple Keeper, a beginner or someone wondering whether you should take it on. Along with easy to understand descriptions of the fittings and installations in the tower, it also contains photographs and videos to show you what they are explaining. Their aim in this document are:

- The help understand the installation in your tower
- Describe the checks to be carried out to identify a problem
- To advice you on maintenance tasks that you should be able to carry out
- To help you recognise the tasks that require specialist knowledge from a bell hanger or other expert

PRESENT SITUATION — POST COVID

There are no monthly meetings at present as a replacement organiser has not so far come forward. There are 60 ringers in the Codgers address list so it should be possible for a volunteer (or volunteers) to step forward!

It would certainly be a shame if Codgers ceased, as it has been running since the early 1990's. The organiser's duties are fairly minimal and could easily be shared by more than one person. Usually the pub menu is circulated to members and forwarded to the pub on the Monday before the meeting.

A Risk Assessment must be generated for each meeting which although it may seem an onerous task being 5 pages long, only the first two pages change each month. The organiser(s) also need to nominate a ringer to run the ringing at each tower.

Perhaps the present format of the meetings requires change, eg only one tower per meeting and a pub lunch so the afternoons are free? Anything is possible depending on what is required by the members.

Codgers; is a group of ringers across Sussex of all ages who get together to for a mini-outing once a month. Although members are predominantly from Sussex there are several from other counties. The group will happily ring rounds and call changes as well as more difficult methods. Ringers of all ages and skills are welcome as long as they can handle a bell safely by themselves with reasonable striking.

The Codgers meet once a month, usually on the first Wednesday. The usual arrangement is to ring at two towers with a pub lunch between towers. The group also have a longer summer outing, usually in June each year.

The venue for the month is published in the calendar. Details are also circulated to the Codgers mailing list about one week beforehand. Anyone interested in coming along can get more details from the calendar.

KEYMER, St Cosmas & St Damian

There is currently NO ringing at Keymer due to works being carried out on the church walls. This includes both service and practice ringing.



WHAT'S UP THERE?

Lowfield Heath, St Michael & All Angels

Lowfield Heath is what remains of the last surviving building of a former

village situated within the borough of Crawley. When the church was first built, it was under the parish of Charlwood and can be found in Stahlschmidt's book Surrey bells and London bell founders on page 140. It says: LOWFIELD HEATH, St. Michael. Modern church and modern bell. At the time he visited, there was only one bell cast by Warners.

The foundation of the stone was laid 15th July 1867. Both bells were rung from the ground floor by red sallied ropes. The ringing room has since been converted into a kitchen and the church is now owned by the Seventh Day Adventists. The tower is accessed by a tight staircase which first comes to a clock room. & Johnston. At the time of the installation of the clock, they also supplied

them with a clock bell which can also be chimes from the ground floor. The clock no longer runs due to the suspension spring breaking and the

weights are also fully wound! From the clock room, a 19 rung ladder takes you up to the belfry platform where both bells hang.

When the tower was built, a single bell cast by John Warner & Sons was hung for



full circle in Pickford 6.A / Elphick Z trussed frame on plain bearing. The

bell measures 22.00" in diameter and rings in the key of F# at 1481Hz. It is strapped to a wooden headstock with a Conventional canon. The shrouding on the wheel has all come off leaving this bell unringable.

Hung dead on a wooden beam is a clock bell by Gillett & Johnston. It weighs 7-2-4 cwt and measures 33.50" in diameter. This bell sounds a lot more mellow in tone chiming in the key of C at 1057.5Hz. Gillett's used the then modern form of canon called a Doncaster to strap it to the beam. Inside the bell is a clapper which a hook a rope is connected to. This allows for both bells to be chimed together. Their equivalent is bells 1 & 5 of a ring of 8. Each bell is inscribed as:

Most of the belfry floor has fallen away leaving a large drop underneath the bells. Ladders also go up higher into the spire.
