


# THE NORTHERN DISTRICT NEWS

Rounds & Call Changes on 8, 10 & 12; Plain Hunt on 7 & 9; Grandsire & Plain Bob Triples and bob courses of Grandsire Cinques. There was a break halfway through in the church hall for tea and cake, then ringing continued afterwards.

# East Grinstead Bells Celebration

On 6th November 2022 we celebrated the 40th Anniversary of St Swithun's Bells. It was in 1982 that 10 bells of the current ring of 12 + 2# were hung in the tower. The original eight bells were installed in 1813 by Thomas Mears of London but necessary restoration work in the late 1970s and early 1980s resulted in the opportunity being taken to augment them to ten bells. This normally expensive exercise was made possible by fundraising, covenanting and grants. In 1981

the bells were ordered from the Royal Eijsbouts Foundry in the Netherlands, with fittings from Eayres and Smith. The local ringers removed the old bells, frame and grillage and did much of the hard work to enable the work to be completed at the minimum cost. The further three bells were added in 1985 again with much of the hard work to install them being done by the ringers themselves.

# New SCACR Membership System!

A few members have been asking about renewing their membership for 2023. We're very excited to announce that a brand new, modern membership system is about to be launched. From January 2023, SCACR will be using a new system to manage memberships, including proposing new members and renewal of existing members. This system will automate many processes that were previously done manually, which took up a lot of our volunteers' valuable time. Additionally, the old email system was rapidly approaching end-of-life, so urgently needed replacing. Read more...

#### How to renew your membership

Every member must complete their *own* individual renewal form. "Yellow forms" for membership renewals will *not* be sent to tower correspondents. (Tower information (e.g. practice and service ringing times) will be requested separately.)

Members with an email address will receive a link to the secure online membership system (Membermojo), through which they must review their personal details, select communications options (e.g. news and updates by District), and pay their subscription. Members can make secure payments with their credit / debit card, or Apple Pay or Google Pay from a phone.

For members who don't have email or access to a computer or smartphone with internet access, the Membership Secretary will post a paper renewal form to their home address, and update the records on their behalf. Tower Correspondents will continue to have a duty to cascade District / Association communications to these members.

#### How to propose a new member of the Association

New members can join at *any* time during the year (not at a meeting). New members should apply for membership via the online system, and provide contact details of their proposer and seconder. For the few people who do not have access to a computer or smartphone, a <u>paper membership form</u> can be completed and posted to the Membership Secretary.

As previously, new members must be proposed and seconded by current, adult ringing members of the Association,

#### FIRST QUARTER ON THE BELLS

Kingston-near-Lewes, an ancient ring of 3 that has recently been restored by Blyth & Co has had the first quarter peal rung on it to our knowledge. 1260 of Reverse Bob Singles was rung on Saturday 19th November by John Greenhough - *Treble*; Michael Royalton-Kisch - *Second* and Matthew Smith - *Tenor*.

The bells are rung from the ground floor in a straight line, similar to the nearby church in Iford.

# **ASSOCIATION NEWS**

#### Twineham, St Peter

I'm sure many of you know Twineham, the ring of 5 in a brick tower, but have you ever considered them to be a ring of 6? Plans for Twineham have been put in place for an augmentation by adopting a bell from the Keltek Trust to add a new treble. The work is being carried out by Whites of Appleton who have just restored the bells for Alfriston, St Andrew. Whites have already done a survey of the belfry to see what they're working with. The new treble will need to be installed above the rest on another level as the current bells



almost fill the belfry with a small space in the North corner.

A quarter peal of Twineham Bob Doubles was rung there on October 24th by 4 members of The Sussex Youngers (including me) and Jo Worsely. This is suspected to be the last quarter peal rung on them as a 5.







Let's give a brief bit of history on the bells so far.

Prior to the 16th century, Twineham had a small wooden church that contained a single bell dating to the 13th century. In the 16th century, the church was demolished and on the same

site, a church made of brick was erected, making it the first church to be constructed of brick in Sussex!

At the time, 2 bells were hung in the church with one dating c1522 and the other c1544. Pictures of them are above. Both of these are cast by John Tonne who also cast the bell at Sullington in the What's Up There? All of Tonne's bells have a very recognisable tone and have many features that suggest he learnt bell founding from abroad:



The profile, canon structure and also his choice of ornaments.

His bells at Twineham are highly decorated featuring crosses, a medallion of King Henry VII and fleur de lis stops. He used gothic blackletter text with each letter cast from wax on grounds. The inscription on the 4th is interesting, translating to "here I come again rechristened Peter", an inscription like this would suggest it is the recast of the old bell.

In 1635, Bryan I Eldridge added a tenor to make a chime of 3. 1912 saw the biggest change to the bells as Mears & Stainbank rehung them in a new frame and augmented them to five. The tenor was also recast suggesting it cracked. Each bell contains a latin inscription too! The bells are hung in a timber frame in the standard 5 bell layout. Access to the belfry is by a hatch which is directly under bell 3. 2 bells in 1544; 3 bells in 1724; 5 in 1912 and soon to be a 6 in the next

year or two.


# Alfriston, St Andrew

Since the previous issue, the newly restored bells of Alfriston have been hung back up in the tower and are ready to be rung.

On 02/01/2023, I carried out an inspection after some marvellous ringing on the bells.

A correction to the previous issue of Northern News, the service bell was the old 4. This bell was shown as being cast by an unidentified founder. This bell has a Diamond stop between each word identical to the one on the 2nd at Poynings. The number 5 on this bell is identical to it too.

However, the Poynings



bell was cast by Edmund Giles. 1587 is too early for Giles, therefore the service bell must have been cast by his predecessor John Cole.

# **Updates to Sussex Bells and Belfries**

### CHICHESTER, Market Cross:

This Richard Phelps bell from the old Market Cross was in the city Library of Chichester on the landing when George Elphick visited in 1937. It is now on the first floor in The Novium museum. *Visited* 27/10/2022

## RUSPER, St Mary Magdalene:

In 2007, Rusper was overhauled by Nicholson Engineering. During this, the treble was tuned down to become the 2nd; a new treble was cast by Whitechapel; the timber frame was raised up and new trusses for bells 2,3 and 5 were installed. *Visited 19/12/2022* 

The inscription on the 2007 treble reads as follows:

# EAST GULDEFORD, St Mary:

The bell that was reported on the floor of the church has been transferred to Watch Bell Street in Rye. It now sits on a brick pedestal. All 6 canons have broken off leaving just the Argent. It is also badly cracked in the crown. *Visited* 26/11/2022. Inscription:

THO: LESTER MADE ME J724 (four coins)








Fig. 1 Chichester Market Cross

# WHAT'S UP THERE?

Sullington, St Mary



Sullington, St Mary's has a single bell hung in a tower dating from around 1050 containing Norman windows bricked up on each wall. It is likely a single long waisted bell like the one at Hardham and Warminghurst was present when the church was first built. In the 16th century, John Tonne cast three bells but only the tenor remains today. In 1724, it was recorded that 3 bells were in the church, one was sold off because it was cracked and the other is believed to



have been stolen! By the time A. Daniel Tyssen's Father (George Elphick's predecessor) inspected Sullington, there was just a singular bell.







The date that Tyssen gives this bell is false, Tyssen gives 1522 (m\*ccccc\* xxij\*) but Elphick and myself confirm it to be 1529 (m\*ccccc\* xxix\*)

The bell is rung from the ground floor and originally was a ring of 3 in a straight line. The treble was hung in the East pit; the 2nd in the middle and the tenor in the West pit. A 20 rung ladder is required to access the belfry. The bell today is still hung in the timber frame made of an curved braces, similar to that at Botolph. The clapper is of mediaeval shape and is practically identical to Warminghurst's.

The inscription is very nice! Above the inscription band is an ornamental ring also found on the bells at Twineham. Each letter was cast from wax and made on grounds.





Underneath the inscription band at the top of the waist is a medallion which appears to feature the annunciation.

This bell measures 24.88" in diameter and weighs around 3cwt.

The inscription reads as follows:
