NORTHERN DISTRICT NEWS

The Coronation Bell - Horsham

On February 21st, the 4th at Horsham, St Mary the Virgin, cracked during a practice, after the stay wedged itself in the frame, bringing the bell to an abrupt stop. The bell cracked around the crown, leaving the rest of the bell balanced on the bottom on the wheel and crown staple.

Whites of Appleton were contacted and came to lower the bell into a safe position.

The initial idea was to get the bell welded. The only disadvantage with this is that it has around a 5 - 10 year guarantee in this state. Plan B was to get the bell recast by Whestleys, but due to cost, this was succeeded by Plan C to have a new bell cast by Taylors of Loughborough.

On June 7^{th} , Whites came to take the bell away for scrap. Due to the tenor being hung above the trapdoor, it was winched at an angle, providing enough room for the 4^{th} to pass around it. By quarter-past 3, the bell was out of the tower and in the van.



On New Years Eve 1814, the Horsham ringers were down in The Anchor pub while a fearful storm raged over the town. On the way back to the church to ring for the 11 o'clock service, they found that lightning had struck the tower, ripping the seats from the walls and cracking two of the bells. These were the present 4th and 9th.

On June 7th, the churchwardens' accounts show that Thomas Mears were the contractors:

"Resolved, That Mr Thomas Mears of Whitechapel London Bell Founder be employed by the Churchwardens to recast the 2nd and 7th Bells and that the Vestry Clerk request him by Letter to send an Estimate of the Expence of the same and of taking down and replacing them including Carriage to and from London."


The cost to have these two bells recast came to £65 13s 8d.

The bells are inscribed as follows:

- 4. T. MEARS OF LONDON FECIT 1815 [Seven Leaves, See below]
- 9. THOMAS MEARS OF LONDON FECIT 1815 [Band of loops, See below]

The replacement bell is covered by the insurance as accidental damage (good maintenance records were essential for the claim!). The bell is being cast on August 17th this year. The new forth is expected to return later this year with a dedication to King Charles III. This would also be the first bell to not be cast at Whitechapel to be hung in the tower since 1752. Prior to this, there were 6 bells, one of them being a 32cwt tenor by Bryan II Eldridge.

In the meantime, the ringers continue to ring on bells 1,3,5,6,7,8,9,10.

Ringing for the Coronation:

WHAT'S UP THERE?






Edburton is part of the 5 downland church group containing Pyecombe, Newtimber, Poynings, Fulking and of course Edburton. The bells in these churches are all completely different in their own way and so is the access to their belfries!

Edbuton has three bells hung in a west facing tower dating to around the 14th century. They were once rung by ropes and it would appear they swung east to west judging by the position of the rope holes.

George Elphick visited in February 1948, 2 years before the bells were overhauled by Mears & Stainbank to be hung dead and chimed by Ellacombe.

Elphick tells us that they were once hung for ringing in a M.11.14.15 frame. To break this down, M is one of the standard timber trusses used (M is a 5.D truss in the Pickford Scheme); the 11 refers to the struts which go from the braces to the frame heads. In this case, the 11 means they extend outwards; The 14 refers to the end frame heads being in line with the long heads and the 15 refers to the frame place being below the sills.



Today, they are fixed between two parallel wooden Beams. 1.A in the Pickford scheme.

Access to the belfry is by a tight spiral staircase which first leads to an intermediate chamber. From here a 12 rung ladder takes you up to the belfry.

The belfry contains three bells strapped to wooden headstocks by a conventional canon. The weights and diameters are as follows:

1. 6-3-0, 32.75" **2**. 7-2-0, 34.25" **3**. 8-3-0, 36.63"

Taking a look at the notes of the bells C Bb A, this is equivalent to bells 1-3 of a ring of 5 or 4-6 of a ring of 8. The 2nd is rather interesting because the partials produced are very similar to that of a Simpson tuned bell.

Each bell is cast by a different founder. The trebles was cast by a William Chamberlain and can be identified by the three shields inscribed on the bell. The bell is inscribed using gothic blackletters on wax grounds. Like most of Chamberlain's bells, he uses the commonly found phase "Sancta ... Ora Pro Nobis." The ... being the name of a saint. In this case it is Katerina. Like the rest, it has a normal clapper with a rope tied around the flight.

The 2nd was cast by Bryan Eldridge Jnr* from Chertsey. There is one way we can distinguish the difference between him and his fathers bells. Bryan the Elder used a heart shaped stop between each word whereas his son used a fleur de lis stop. This bell contains the fleur de lis with his GLORIA DEO IN EXCELSIS inscription. This is followed by the date 1639 and his initials B E separated with another stop.

The tenor is found on the west side of the belfry and was cast by Thomas Bullisdon around 1510. We can assign this to be his work by the shield featuring his initials. The rest of the inscription is the same as the treble except the font and the saint is different. Anna is the saint on this bell.



Each bell as mentioned above is inscribed in Latin. In English, these translate as:


- 1. Sancta Katerina Ora Pro Nobis St Kathrine Pray before us.
- 2. GLORIA DEO IN EXCELSIS Glory to God in the highest.
- 3. Santa Anna Ora Pro Nobis St Anna Pray before us.

THE CHAMBERLAIN SHIELDS

The three shields can be described as the chamberlain flag shield, the mercy shield and the crosskeys shield and are typically found in this order on his bells.

The mercy shield features the phrase "ihu merci ladi help." between each word is a

fleur de lis connected to the end of a cross. The crosskeys shield has a laver, a wheat sheaf, a dolphin and a bell between the spaces of the two keys. It is very rare that these ornaments are not found together. A bell and Woodmancote has no other inscription except these three shields.
