This is an annual event with people from each Archdeaconry selected and awarded. The certificate is signed by the Bishop of Chichester, Dr Martin Warner and a badge bearing the episcopal coat of arms of St Richard, is mounted on a blue ribbon

As a result, a lovely afternoon was spent at Chichester Cathedral on the 30th September, being part of the service of evensong for the investiture of our own Vicky Chase, into the Order of St Richard. Congratulations to Vicky who was nominated by Reverend Vivien from St Giles church Graffham, and seconded by Alison Davidson, who are both ringers at St Giles. They were both impressed with Vicky's enthusiasm, determination, motivation of others and effectiveness within her role of Training Team Leader for SCACR. The award also 'represents all bell ringers within the county and the input they all provide'.

The first church was St Mary's at **Stoughton**. The picturesque village is nestled in the Ems Valley, and the church is above the village, itself being a mainly 11th century church. The tower has 6 bells, the oldest being cast in c1393! The bells are very easy going, and provided a good start to the afternoon! Ringing here consisted of Rounds, Call Changes, Bob Doubles, Grandsire, Stedman and Cambridge. Thanks to Tim Wright for running the ringing here!

The bells of St Mary & St Gabriels Church at South Harting can be seen as a challenge for some. The tower is at the chancel crossing, and the 6 bells are rung from the ground floor, in the middle of the church. This means there is a long and unguided rope draught, meaning the ropes can move and behave unexpectedly. However this is overcome with a long straight pull, and unnoticed when you get used to it! Everyone had a go and we had some Rounds, Call Changes, Plain Hunt and Bob Minor here. It was a great afternoon with a good turnout!



Ringing Downunder!

It was third time lucky for my husband Tony and I to be fortunate to go on our 'once in a lifetime' trip to Australia with the dreaded covid the reason for the delay. However, it was well worth the wait! One of the many highlights for me, was the opportunity to ring at 'The Swan Bell Tower' in Perth. How fortunate that one of our 'freedom days' coincided with the tower being open.

Situated by and overlooking the 'Swan River', the copper and glass tower has been custom built at 82.5 metres tall (217 feet) and has a quite a majestic aura! There are 16 bells with two extra chromatic note bells and makes them the second largest set of change ringing bells in the world! 12 of the bells are from St Martin-in-the-Fields, Trafalgar Square, London as a donation to celebrate the 1988 bicentenary celebrations. Five of the other six were presented to the people of Western Australia (WA) by the City of London and Westminster and a number of British and Western Australian mining companies. They were cast by the Whitechapel Foundry in recent years with donation of metals mined in WA. One of the bells was commissioned by the WA Government,

With a combined weight of about 9 tonnes, the tower, fortunately, is composed of reinforced concrete! In 2018, to commemorate the centenary of World War 1, another 6.5 tonne bell was cast which is swung electronically each day

at midday. Known as the 'Great ANAZAC Bell'. this is spectacular to watch.



Following a very prompt e mail response from the Tower Captain, I was encouraged to come and join the ringing with the band which happens only twice a week – how fortunate was I. I did as instructed and went straight to the reception area and amid some very strange looks from the waiting tourists, (my husband even came with me!) we made our way via the stairs with the knowledge that soon, those tourists will be able to watch the ringing from the viewing tower. No pressure! Fortunately, the tourists are not visible to the ringers! (They also have the opportunity to chime a bell as part of their tour!)



What a welcoming band the ringers were and I was soon given a rope. My pleas of 'let me in gently' was responded with 'we've been told differently' and it turned out that two of my ringing buddies, the Bickers family, had been there the previous week and pre-empted them! I couldn't get away with that even all those miles away!!! The band kept me busy for the hour until I asked for a rest! I managed to ring some rounds and call changes and sometimes on 10. The bells were lovely with a long draft. The height of some of the boxes needed for the heavier bells were impressive but not for me I'm afraid! One of the ringers encouraged my hubby to have a chime once the bells were down and he did rather well. I did explain that there were some things I need to be able to do that he can't and so requested that they don't encourage him too much!!!!! I think he quietly quite enjoyed himself.

There is the privilege to purchase a polo shirt with an embroidered Swan Tower logo for anyone who has rung at the tower which I duly did! Here are Helen and Harry showing off theirs!!!

I would recommend any ringer who is fortunate to go to Perth, to take the opportunity to ring at the Swan Bell Tower. It is a great experience!




It was just a 30 minute walk back to Upper Beeding for those who had left their car there at the start or the opportunity to catch the bus! The rain managed to keep away!

CCCBR UPDATE October 2023

This is written following the 2023 annual meeting weekend held during the first few days of September in Ipswich. The weather was warm and sunny with many activities available over three days. For me it was marked by having completed six years as Deputy President, this meant that I had finished my term of office. Being Deputy President has been a great honour and privilege; especially during a time when the Central Council has been modernising the way it works, hopefully to better serve ringers across the world.

Most of the business discussed at the actual meeting was fairly routine and without incident. A new President (Tina Stoecklin) was elected along with a new Deputy (Vicki Chapman) and also an ordinary trustee. For this last post there were two candidates and a very close vote with Ian Roulstone getting one more vote than Alison Hodge.

One major item on the agenda was whether there should be a reduction in the number of representatives elected to the Central Council. The suggestion would have meant that rather than the current five representatives Sussex would have been entitled to three. On the lead up to the meeting there had been strong views expressed on the subject, these included a possible amendment that would have resulted in every Association and Guild being entitled to just one representative. From the outset it became clear the feeling of the meeting was to retain the status quo. Many of those present voiced the opinion that they felt as if they belonged to something that was important and assisted those ringers they represented. When put to the vote it was obvious that the proposal did not have enough support and therefore the current formula for working out the number of representatives each Association or Guild is entitled remains. It is hoped that ALL representatives will get involved in the work of the Central Council and report back to the people who have elected them, this is sometimes sadly not the case. It would appear that some still see being a Central Council representative as more a 'badge of honour' than anything else.

Along with social events in the evenings there were ringing development sessions all day on Friday and Sunday afternoon. On Sunday there was an open meeting to discuss the Ringing 2030 initiative which many found useful with ideas they wanted to take back to their own Associations.

What of the future? I am still remaining as the Central Council representative for the Western District and will still continue to update what is happening, it is hoped that this is a two way street with any ideas from the grass roots being fed in to the system. Please do remember that anyone can get involved with the Central Council and join one of the workgroups. In 2024 the annual meeting weekend is being arranged in Devon, for me I hope that it won't be quite as stressful as the last few years when I was in charge of all the arrangements for the weekend!
